EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Sacramento County Office of Emergency Services participated in a Winter Storm Virtual Tabletop Exercise (VTTX) that is sponsored by the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA), Emergency Management Institute (EMI) as one of a series of virtual exercises designed to bring numerous communities together in a collaborative environment. This After Action Report/Improvement Plan (AAR/IP) follows guidance set forth by the U.S Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP).

The nearly four-hour, facilitator-led discussion touched the core capabilities of Planning, Public Information and Warning and Operational Coordination. This AAR/IP summarizes the success of the exercise in meeting its goals.

Several strengths were noted in the County's understanding and performance of emergency procedures and roles. There were also several areas that could be improved based on the gaps, challenges, and recommended actions identified in the VTTX. These identified areas of improvement provided a basis of recommending a series of corrective actions or assignments in Appendix A. Improvement areas actions included coordinated training, plan review, and outreach to external partners.

Exercise Dates

November 9, 2016 8:00 am – 1:00 pm

Scope

This is a discussion-based exercise, planned for four hours hosted by the Emergency Management Institute (EMI) and conducted with multiple remote Video Teleconference sites including Sacramento County.

Mission Area(s)

Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response and Recovery

Core Capabilities

Planning, Public Information and Warning; Operational Coordination; Situation Awareness

Objectives

- Discuss the capability to deliver coordinated, prompt, reliable and actionable information to the whole community.
- Discuss the capability to establish and maintain a unified and coordinated operational structure and process that integrates all critical stakeholders.
- Discuss the capability to provide decision-makers with decision-relevant information regarding the nature and extent of hazards.

Threat or Hazard

Winter Storm

Scenario

The Winter Storm VTTX was designed around the realistic scenario of winter storm with warning and builds to a significant snow fall which causes significant effort and actions by the participating jurisdictions and agencies.

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ANALYSIS OF CORE CAPABILITIES

Aligning exercise objectives and core capabilities provides a consistent taxonomy for evaluation that transcends individual exercises to support preparedness reporting and trend analysis. Table 1 includes the exercise objectives, aligned core capabilities, and performance ratings for each core capability as observed during the exercise and determined by the evaluation team.

The following sections provide an overview of the performance related to each exercise objective and associated core capability, highlighting strengths and areas for improvement.

Core Capability: Planning, Public Information and Warning; Operational Coordination; Situational Awareness;

Objectives:

- Discuss the capability to deliver, coordinated, prompt, reliable and actionable information to the whole community
- Discuss the capability to establish and maintain a coordinated and unified structure and process that integrates all stakeholders

• Discuss the capability to provide decision makers with decision relevant information regarding the nature and extent of hazard

The strengths and areas for improvement for each core capability aligned to this objective are described in this section.

Strengths

The structure of the exercise focused on a multimedia, facilitated format for the national players as well as Sacramento County players. This scenario, winter storm with warning and builds to a significant rain fall and heavy winds upwards of 80 mph gusts which causes significant effort and actions by the participating jurisdictions and agencies. The disciplines were well represented enabling quality discussion.

Top three strengths:

- 1. The exercise highlighted the depth of resources, skill sets and trained personnel internal to Sacramento County (including the cities) to handle a Winter Storm event.
- 2. The VTTX identified the capabilities of our partners and department personnel to respond to a Winter Storm event in Sacramento County and highlighted the existing partnership and ongoing emergency management coordination efforts with other local departments/agencies, particularly two neighboring cities.
- 3. The ICS system works very well in Sacramento County as the first responder community each knows their roles and responsibilities with on scene incident management and stakeholder integration.
- 4. The coordination of information from the field level to the individual DOC, EOC levels enabled the decision makers to receive vital information related to the event in a timely manner. It also proved to be efficient for the County and local Public Information Officers to relay accurate and timely information to the public, families and the media.

Areas for Improvement

Sacramento County participants altered the scenarios to fit their needs to ensure valuable learning for all and discussed the effects of a severe Winter Storm. There were multiple areas for improvement identified and are listed in the following:

- My need to be more focused for each VTTX and bring in the appropriate players such as Animal Care and Regulation in the case of this VTTX.
- Conduct Routine pre-event equipment checks in the EOC.
- Coordination internally on a Fuel Allocation and Distribution Plan
- Homeless Population care and sheltering integrations into the existing Care and Shelter Plan.
- Coordination with key Utilities within Sacramento County.

Analysis:

Overall participants expressed satisfaction with the exercise. There was total agreement by all participants that increased exercises of this nature, with the right scenario for the player and

appropriate players in the room would definitely continue to strengthen the capabilities of the Operational Area.

Participant Survey

Participants were asked to rank elements of the exercise on a five-point scale with 1 indicating strong disagreement with the statement and 5 indicating strong agreement. All participants (N=18) participated in the survey.

The exercise was well structured and organized		
The exercise scenario was plausible and realistic		
The multimedia presentation helped the participants understand and become engaged in the scenario.		
The facilitator(s) was knowledgeable about the material, kept the exercise on target, and was sensitive to group dynamics		
The situation manual used during the exercise was a valuable tool throughout the exercise.		
Participation in the exercise was appropriate for someone in my position		
The participants included the right people in terms of level and mix of disciplines		

- It worked for the time alloted but would like to spend more time discussing potential and past issues that may happen again.
- If all attendees arrived, the discussion would improve. As it was, the participation was very good.
- Maybe use the white board more to see all the ideas that are being thrown out.
- I thought it was a very productive exercise. Props can always help, maybe photos/videos, etc.
- I would like to participate in more exercises.
- Good exercise
- Having a scenario that is more realistic to our area that the group doesn't need to figure out how to tweak it to spur the conversation.
- For the sake of time, the group of participants from Sacramento County though that calling out agencies to speak to their top 3 points from the discussion questions would help in keeping the attention for the other groups across the country, the questions should be summarized rather than all answered in detail.
